The Confession of Sin

Matthew 22:34-40

- ³⁴ But when the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together.
- ³⁵ And one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him.
- ³⁶ "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?"
- ³⁷ And he said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.
- ³⁸ This is the great and first commandment.
- ³⁹ And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself.
- ⁴⁰ On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets."

Question 25: Since there is but one Divine Being (Deut. 6:4), why do you speak of three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Ghost?

Answer: Because God has so revealed Himself in His Word (Isa. 61:1; Ps. 110:1; Matt. 3:16–17; Matt. 28:19; 1 John 5:7), that these three distinct persons are the one, true, eternal God.

The Belgic Confession

Article 14: The Creation and Fall of Man, and His Incapacity to Perform What Is Truly Good

We believe that God created man out of the dust of the earth, and made and formed him after His own image and likeness, ⁽¹⁾ good, righteous, and holy, capable in all things to will agreeably to the will of God. ⁽²⁾ But being in honor he understood it not, neither knew his excellency, ⁽³⁾ but willfully subjected himself to sin, and consequently to death and the curse, giving ear to the words of the devil. ⁽⁴⁾ For the commandment of life which he had received, he transgressed ⁽⁵⁾; and by sin separated himself from God ⁽⁶⁾ who was his true life, having corrupted his whole nature ⁽⁷⁾ whereby he made himself liable to corporal and spiritual death. ⁽⁸⁾ And being thus become wicked, perverse, and corrupt in all his ways, he hath lost all his excellent gifts which he had received from God ⁽⁹⁾ and only retained a few remains thereof, ⁽¹⁰⁾ which, however, are sufficient to leave man without excuse; ⁽¹¹⁾ for all the light which is in us is changed into darkness, ⁽¹²⁾ as the Scriptures teach us, saying: *The light shineth in darkness, and the darkness comprehendeth it not*; where St. John calleth men darkness. ⁽¹³⁾

Therefore we reject all that is taught repugnant to this concerning the free will of man, since man is but a slave to $\sin^{(14)}$ and has nothing of himself unless it is given him from heaven. For who may presume to boast that he of himself can do any good, since Christ saith, No man can come to Me, except the Father which hath sent Me draw him? Who will glory in his own will, who understands that to be carnally minded is enmity against $God?^{(17)}$ Who can speak of his knowledge, since the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of $God?^{(18)}$ In short, who dare suggest any thought, since he knows that we are not sufficient of ourselves to think any thing as of ourselves, but that our sufficiency is of $God?^{(19)}$ And therefore what the apostle saith ought justly to be held sure and firm, that God worketh in us both to will and to do of His good pleasure. Por there is no will nor understanding conformable to the divine will and understanding but what Christ hath wrought in man, which He teaches us when He saith, Without Me ye can do nothing.

For Family Worship Week of May 5

As your family takes time to worship privately this week, we hope that the following prompts will be helpful to you. They are designed, in the first three days of the week, to help you reflect on the past Sunday's sermon. The next two are designed to turn your eyes toward the coming Sunday's sermon text. Please turn to the "House of Prayer" section of the bulletin for subjects to pray over this week.

Day 1

Past Sunday's Text: Matthew 22:34-40

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Matthew 22:36-38
- Meditation: We begin again with the question. What question is being asked of Jesus? Jesus answers by assuming that the question is correct: there is a great commandment. What does he say that is? In what way does this great commandment summarize all of the law and all of the prophets? How can we strive to love God with all our heart, soul, and mind? What should we do when we fail to live up to this command?
- Close in Prayer

Day 2

- Open Open in Prayer
- Read: Matthew 22:36-39
- Meditation: Jesus mentions a second commandment that goes with the first. What is the second commandment that he mentions? Jesus seems to put these on the same level. Why do you think Jesus mentions these two together rather than just saying there is only one? Do you think we might be imbalanced and fail to love people if we thought all we were supposed to do is love God?
- Close in Prayer

Day 3

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Matthew 22:36-40
- Meditation: In some ways does it make God's law seem less daunting for the believer to think of it more as two commandments than as ten? Think about how Jesus' teaching on these two great commandments relates to the rest of Matthew's gospel so far. In what ways has Jesus loved God with all his heart, soul, and mind? In what ways has Jesus loved his neighbor as himself?

Day 4

Next Sunday's Text: Matthew 22:41-46

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Psalm 110:1-3
- Meditation: In this Psalm, Yahweh invites the future king from David's line to sit at his right hand. In this Psalm, Yahweh speaks in verse 1 to the future king. What can we learn about the future king from David's line from this statement by Yahweh? What are some of the ways that David responds to God's word in verse 1? How should we respond to such a wonderful statement? How we might apply what we see here?

Day 5

- Open in Prayer
- Read: Psalm 110:4-7
- Meditation: In verse 4, Yahweh speaks again to the future king from David's line. What were the role of priests in the life of Israel? What do you think it means for the future king to also be a priest? Why would such a king be superior to the other kings in Israel's history? Jesus applies this passage to himself, and we know that Jesus is our great high priest. What kind of security do we have, knowing that Jesus is the great high priest of all his people?
